

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

In our modern times, symbol can seem to have lost its value. The most recognizable "signs" are ones we see on the road or the branding in advertisements. The logos for major companies don't do much more than perk our interest or disdain.



They surely don't deliver on their promises for our lives to be happier, healthier, and easier.

On this feast of Corpus Christi, we hear the account of the Last Supper. This was Passover, an ancient sign of the covenant of Moses. The Hebrew people celebrated God's providential care for His people. To the listening disciples, Jesus makes a very bold claim. "This is my blood of the covenant." At the time of the first Passover -- the redemption of the Hebrew people from slavery to the Egyptians -- the blood of the sacrificial lamb was spread on the lintels of the doorpost. Tomorrow, some of the disciples would witness the blood of the new covenant spread across the wood of the cross.

Christ's Body and Blood are more than a sign. They are a sacrament. In the sacrament, the sign makes real what it signifies. More than ritual, a sacrament enacts truth of the covenantal love of God and His promise of fidelity. It's a promise God keeps. The same bread and wine of that first Holy Thursday liturgy becomes -- throughout the centuries and until the end of time -- the very Body and Blood of Christ. On this feast, we celebrate the unfailing covenantal love of our God. As you partake in the Eucharist today, and next Sunday, and the Sunday after that, remember that you receive neither a meaningless sign nor an empty offer. You receive God Himself, as He fulfills His promise to remain with us always.

Feast of Corpus Christi


This feast was celebrated in the Catholic Church on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday to solemnly commemorate the institution of the Holy Eucharist; however, it has been moved to be celebrated on the Sunday after the Feast of the Holy Trinity.

The instrument in the hand of Divine Providence was St. Juliana of Mont Cornillon, in Belgium. Born in Liège and orphaned at an early age, she was educated by the Augustinian nuns of Mont Cornillon. In time she made her religious profession and became the Mother Superior. Intrigues of various kinds over time drove her from her convent. She died on April 5, 1258, at the House of the Cistercian nuns at Fosses and was buried at Villiers.

Juliana, from her early youth, had a great veneration for the Blessed Sacrament and always longed for a special feast in its honor. She made known her ideas to several well -known church leaders and theologians of the time right up to Pope Urban IV. One such person, Bishop Robert de Thorete, was favorably impressed; and, since bishops had the right of ordering feasts for their dioceses, he called a synod in 1246 and ordered the celebration to be held in the following year, also, that an Office should be written for the Feast.

Bishop de Thorete did not live to see the execution of his order, for he died October 16, 1246; but the feast was celebrated for the first time by the canons of St. Martin at Liège. St. Juliana and a sister companion now brought a request to the new Bishop of Liège asking that the pope extend the celebration to the entire world. Urban IV published an official Papal Bull on September 8, 1264 and ordered the annual celebration of Corpus Christi on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday (now since moved to the Sunday after the feast of the Holy Trinity).

The Office for the Feast of Corpus Christi, composed by the Angelic Doctor St. Thomas Aquinas, is one of the most beautiful in the Roman Breviary and has been admired even by Protestants. The Feast is celebrated in the Greek Orthodox Church, the Armenian Orthodox Church, other Eastern-rite churches, the Anglican Episcopal Church, and the Lutheran Church.
