7th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Gospels continue to challenge us to the core. This is especially true in the way our social relationships have developed. Feeling safe and secure in the world are

not things that come easily these days. Actually, we may find ourselves feeling more reservation, caution, reluctance, and fear than ever before. In a moment's notice, life can drastically change. When someone has been intentionally and violently hurt, especially someone we love, we can all too easily find ourselves very attracted to the Old Testament philosophy of "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth."

Intellectually, we know this is not what Jesus wants us to do. But on some level it just seems to make practical or even political sense. After all, why should we allow someone to get away with a heinously violent act? Yet, Jesus cannot be any clearer than he is with this! Offer no resistance to one who is evil. Turn the other cheek as well. When pressed into service, go two miles. Do not turn your back on one who wants to borrow. Love your enemies. Now, take a moment to reflect on all of this. Consider a horrible act of violence committed against someone you love. Listen. Think. Be honest. Can you do as Jesus directs?

We want to be holy. But we are more comfortable with a definition of holiness that can keep us saying our prayers and on our knees in church. We are not comfortable with a definition of holiness that has something to say about to how we react to and negotiate life. We like to keep a sharp and strong line between the secular and the sacred. In fact, we would prefer that the doors between them be kept closed. God wants us to be holy as He is holy. If God sees this one way and we see it another, then where does this leave us on our journey to God?

Our minds like the practical, worldly, and secular answers to things. They are more black and white and at first glance appear to make more sense. Holiness wells up from our souls and is beyond reason. It cannot be explained. It is something we just simply know comes as a result of deep prayer. The truly contemplative eye knows inwardly that what Jesus asks is true and then willingly does it. It may not be easy.

~ Black History Month ~ We Celebrate

On June 12, 2019, Fr. Augustus Tolton advanced along the path to sainthood making the runaway slave-turned-priest one step closer to being the first black American saint.



Pope Francis recognized the

heroic virtue of Fr. Tolton making him "venerable" within the Church, only two steps away from canonization. With the decree, Catholics are now authorized to pray directly to Fr. Tolton as an intercessor before God.

Venerable John Augustus Tolton was born into slavery in Monroe County, Missouri in 1854. He escaped slavery with his family during the Civil War by crossing the Mississippi River into Illinois. "John, boy, you're free. Never forget the goodness of the Lord," Tolton's mother reportedly told him after the crossing.

The young Tolton entered St. Peter's Catholic School in Quincy, Illinois with the help of the school's pastor, Fr. Peter McGirr. The priest went on to baptize Tolton, instruct him for his first Holy Communion, and recognize his vocation to the priesthood.

At that time, no American seminary would accept Tolton because of his race, so he studied for the priesthood in Rome. However, when Father Tolton returned to the U.S. after his ordination in 1889, thousands of people lined the streets to greet him. A brass band played hymns and Negro Spirituals, and black and white people processed together into the local church.

Father Tolton was the first African American to be ordained a priest. He served for three years at a parish in Quincy, before moving to Chicago to start a parish for black Catholics, St. Monica's, where he remained until his death in 1897.

After two miracles through his particular intercession are verified by the Vatican, Father Tolton can be declared a saint of the Catholic Church and celebrated for his sanctity.



Lenten Disciplines of Fasting & Abstinence

Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal.

Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.

The Church in Central and Eastern Europe

Belarus is situated between Russia, Ukraine, Poland, and the Baltic states of Lithuania and Latvia. One of the first republics to be incorporated into the Soviet Union, Belarus suffered under communism for over 70 years. Although Belarus declared independence in 1991, the work to restore the Church continues even now, decades after the fall of the Iron Curtain.

In Baranovichi, Belarus, the parish of Divine Mercy and Our Lady of the Gate of Dawn was created in November 2013, by Bishop Antoni Dziemianko of the Pinsk diocese to meet the growing need of the faithful in the region. This residential region of the city, built in the Soviet era, has no churches. However, as the town of Baranovichi grows, the Catholic community grows and with it grow spiritual and social needs that include a parish church building in which to worship and a place to meet as a community for religious education and other pastoral programs. Now that the diocese has secured land, the parish needs help to construct a church and pastoral center, which includes facilities for children's catechesis, youth meetings, pastoral care for families, and social gatherings for the community.

Through local efforts, plus supplementary funding from the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe, this dream of building a parish home for the Catholics of Baranovichi, Belarus, is becoming a reality.

Next week, we will take up the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe. This collection supports the Church in more than 20 countries such as Belarus. Funds support the pastoral care, catechesis, building renovations, and seminary formation. Please be generous in this collection. Envelopes are in the pews for your convenience.
