#### 15<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

Using the best seeds doesn't always guarantee the best plants. An older Italian gentleman straight from Italy gave me these amazing tomato seeds that he claimed produced the best tomatoes ever grown. Without doubt,

the fruit he shared with me was a testament to that fact. These tomatoes were amazing! I couldn't wait until the next growing season to plant these seeds and harvest my own tomatoes. The whole experiment ended up a failure. I did everything the gentleman said, but my fruit didn't even come close. What happened? At first I was perplexed, then some years later the light dawned. The problem wasn't the seeds, it was the soil!

You cannot sow seeds in any old place and in a haphazard way and expect them to be at their best. It doesn't work that way. Planting the seeds is the easiest part. Preparing the soil is the challenge. Tilling, mulching, enriching, and building up the nutrients are all required for good fruit. Then after the seeds are planted, more care is required in order to maintain that healthy, nutrient rich environment for those seeds to sprout, grow, and flourish. God happily sows the seeds of his Word. What do we do with them?

If we expect to be a passive bystander and have good fruit magically grow, we are mistaken. Bearing the good fruit of God's Word requires preparation and work. We have to cultivate the soil of our lives so that those seeds can find a proper home. This one thing alone takes a great deal of patience, time, and effort. What kind of preparation have we put into our lives so that we can be a recipient of God's seed? It takes a great deal of soul-searching and ego-checking to properly prepare. God is the ever faithful and persistent sower. If the seeds do not bear fruit the first time, God will come back time and time again, giving it another try.

If we have created a suitable bed for sowing, then once the seed is sown, we must properly maintain them. What is our maintenance plan for the seeds of God's Word? We need not only a source for water but a watering schedule. We need to weed, aerate the soil, nurture the young plants, protect them, and provide proper nutrients. What does our spiritual maintenance plan look like? If we have done all things well, imagine what the seeds of God's Word could produce in us!



#### Kateri Tekakwitha, Lily of the Mohawks

Kateri Tekakwitha was a young Mohawk woman who lived in the 17th century. The story of her conversion to Christianity, her courage in the face of suffering and her extraordinary holiness is an inspiration to all Christians. When she was only four years old her parents and brother died of smallpox. Kateri survived the disease, but it left her face badly scarred and her eyesight impaired. Because of her poor vision, Kateri was named "Tekakwitha," which means "she who bumps into things." Kateri was taken in by her uncle who was bitterly opposed to Christianity.

When Kateri was 18 years of age, she began instructions in the Catholic faith in secret. Her uncle finally relented and gave his consent for Kateri to become a Christian, provided that she did not try to leave the Indian village. For joining the Catholic Church, Kateri was ridiculed and scorned by villagers. She was subjected to unfair accusations and her life was threatened. Nearly two years after her baptism, in St. Peter's Chapel at the present Kateri Shrine in Fonda, she escaped to the Mission of St. Francis Xavier, a settlement of Christian Natives in Canada. During the last years of her life, Kateri endured great suffering from a serious illness. She died on April 17, 1680, shortly before her 24th birthday, and was buried in present day Kahnawake, Quebec, Canada. Witnesses reported that within a few minutes of her death, the pock marks from smallpox completely vanished and her face shone with radiant loveliness.

Before her death, Kateri promised her friends that she would continue to love and pray for them in Heaven. Both Native Americans and settlers immediately began praying for her heavenly intercession. Several people, including a priest who attended Kateri during her last illness, reported that Kateri had appeared to them and many healing miracles were attributed to her. Fifty years after Kateri's death the first convent for Indian nuns was established in Mexico and they prayed daily for Sainthood for Blessed Kateri. Their prayers were answered on October 21, 2012 when Kateri was canonized as the first Native American woman to be honored with sainthood.

Kateri, who loved Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, pray for us. Kateri, lover of penance, pray for us.

Kateri, who traveled many miles to learn the faith, pray for us. Kateri, steadfast in all prayer, pray for us.

Kateri, who loved to pray the rosary for all people, pray for us. Kateri, example to your people in all virtues, pray for us. Kateri, humble servant to the sick, pray for us.

Kateri, who by your love of humility gave joy to the angels, pray for us.

Kateri, your holy death gave strength to all Indians to love Jesus and Mary, pray for us.

Kateri, whose scarred face in life became beautiful after death, pray for us.

Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world, spare us, O Lord. Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world, graciously hear us, O Lord. Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world, have mercy on us.

#### From Father Duane's Desk

We have been back for seven weeks now since the Pandemic shutdown. Having started public Masses on Pentecost, we have seen parishioners return to celebrate the Eucharist, praying and worshiping our Lord, and breaking

open the Scriptures through readings and homiletic reflections, albeit in a different atmosphere what with social distancing, hand sanitizing, and masks. But, it is working well, and there is still plenty of room even while maintaining our social distance. We have the capacity to accommodate approximately 100 people for Mass maintaining distance. However, we have only 30 to 35 attending at each Mass.

I write today to encourage those who can attend, to please return (with proper protocols). And I would encourage you to speak to others to let them know St. Matthew Parish is a safe environment to worship our God. I certainly know that the "official" dispensation from the obligation is extended through September 6th. But, if you have no underlying conditions, please come and join us again. I know when we first returned on Pentecost, it felt a little different. But we soon adjusted; and now with the exception of the protocols, it feels comfortable and good again to renew our spirituality in community. Virtual Masses, or Masses for Shut-ins are good, <u>but nothing replaces the Real Thing</u>! I do hope you pass the word we are open. We have room, and we are safe!

On another note, due to COVID-19, CSA in its usual format has been postponed until September. We will through the Archdiocese take up the pledge drive with communication beginning in August. I invite you to review our CSA figures from last year in the Pulse today. <u>They were fantastic, you were great!</u> I am so appreciative.

We would like to do that well again, and I will be sending each of you a letter indicating what we and the Parish Council would like to do this year. There will be a change due to COVID-19 in that the pledge drive will not happen at the local parish but will be conducted through the AoD. Therefore, there will be less paperwork and less contact for our personal protection. In advance, I ask everyone to participate as you did last year. It will mean so much to the parish.

Enjoy the summer. I hope and pray all stay healthy!
