In any case, I'm managing things pretty well on my own, I think. Thanks for thinking of me, but no thanks. My life is only as good as I make it and I have to be sure that all is in order! #### Saint Hedwig ~ Saint of the Day for October 16

Rarely do humans realize the possibilities of the wise use of earthly power and worldly wealth. Saint Hedwig was one of the few.

Born to nobility toward the close of the 12th century, she was married at an early age to Henry, duke of Silesia (now Poland). She bore seven children.

Through her persuasion and personal efforts, several monastic institutions of both men and women were established in Silesia. Several hospitals, one for lepers, were likewise founded. She was personally a great force in establishing peace in the surrounding areas during power struggles. To her great sorrow, she was unable to prevent a pitched battle between the forces of two of her sons, one of whom was dissatisfied over the partition of estates that Henry had made between them.

After she and her husband had made mutual vows of celibacy before the Bishop of Breslau, Hedwig lived mostly at the monastery at Trebnitz where, although not a formal member of the religious institute, she nevertheless participated in the religious exercises of the community. Duke Henry took the tonsure and allowed his beard to grow, like the Cistercian lay brothers (whence his sobriquet of "the Bearded"). Hedwig died in 1243 and was buried at Trebnitz.

Hedwig was canonized in 1267 by Pope Clement IV. She is the patron saint of Poland and several cities in the eastern region of Europe. She is also the patron saint of orphans.

<u>Reflection</u>: Whatever possessions we have are not for our own needs or personal comfort alone; they are also to be used in assisting others. Use of these goods should always promote, never impede, progress in God's love. It is true that earthly things in no way contradict God's love, but rather are evident of it.

#### Blessing of the Harvest

Almighty Lord God, You keep on giving abundance to men in the dew of heaven, and food out of the richness of the soil. We give thanks to Your most gracious majesty for the fruits of the field which we have gathered. We beg of You, in Your mercy, to bless our harvest, which we have received from Your generosity. Preserve it, and keep it from all harm. Grant, too, that all those whose desires You have filled with these good things may be happy in Your protection. May they praise Your mercies forever, and make good use of these good things praising Your Holy Name Forever. Amen.

### **CSA Minute** ~ Sharing Christ

**St. Matthew's CSA Goal** - We have several urgent maintenance issues that need to be addressed. Among them are security



fencing on the Harper side of the church, tree removal from fallen trees, masonry work, and roof repairs, etc. Because the need is immediate, the Council approved taking the funding from our savings. Now, it is imperative that we replace our savings. Part of that replacement will come from the CSA overage.

Our AoD target this year is \$14,358, but we have set an internal parish target of \$60,000. This is less than we actually generated last year but enough so that after our AoD portion is paid, we will have \$40,000 going back into our savings for operational costs.

We urgently need to take care of the maintenance issues at the parish, and we can only do it with your help and sacrifice. We love coming to our church, celebrating liturgy, experiencing the beauty of the Christmas and Easter seasons, this can only happen if we maintain ourselves.
