32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

When doing student report cards, there was a comment the teacher could choose that read: inattentive and easily distracted. Could that comment describe your spiritual life? We can be-

come so consumed with myriad distractions and preoccupations and lose our connection to what is really significant and important. We can become dull. This happens in our human relationships, too. We can easily take the love of others for granted, whether it be a parent, spouse, friend, or a child. We assume and presume that their love will always be there and do very little to cultivate, rejuvenate, and deepen it. Presumption can become a great sin.

We do the same thing with God and our spiritual lives. We presume that God will be merciful. Because we believe that in the end God is going to forgive us anyway, then why put a lot of effort into things now? What's the point? It's far easier to find a comfortable spot, curl up and take a nap! There is no immediate urgency to staying awake and attentive, so we think, and we simply fly by the seat of our pants. Assuming and presuming too much about our relationships, especially our relationship with God, can lead to neglect and abuse. It can even lead to a sense of entitlement, where we actually believe that something is due us without much effort on our part.

Folks who are distracted and preoccupied can find their relationships, especially the primary ones, drifting away. You can actually be married to someone for many years and wake up one morning realizing that you really do not know them or truly recognize them. We have to desire God in order to recognize God. We have to open our hearts, minds, and souls to His Presence so that we can be rejuvenated and refreshed. But we cannot do this if we are distracted or napping. We have to be awake and alert! As a young child eagerly watches for and anticipates that arrival of their parent home, so too we must watch for God's presence. If the anticipation of God's arrival does not excite us and rouse us, then we need to ask why.

The wise person keeps vigilant watch, knowing that in the end they will not be disappointed.

Pope Saint Leo the Great, November 10th

Leo assumed the papacy at a time of increasing barbarian invasions; this, coupled with the decreasing imperial authority in the West, forced the Bishop of Rome to take a more active part in civic and political affairs. He was one of the first bishops of Rome to promote papal primacy based on succession from Peter the Apostle; and he did so as a means of maintaining unity among the churches.

Besides recourse to the biblical references, Leo also described his own special relationship with Peter in terms derived from Roman law. He called himself an unworthy heir and deputy of Peter, having received his apostolic authority and obliged to follow his example. On the one hand, Peter stood before him with a claim on how Leo was to exercise his office; on the other hand, Leo, as the Roman bishop, represented the Apostle, whose authority he held. The office of the Roman bishop, was grounded on the special relationship between Christ and Peter; therefore, Leo depended on Peter's mediation, his assistance and his example in order to be able to adequately fulfill his role and exercise his authority as the Bishop of Rome, both in the city and beyond.

Leo drew many learned men about him. Leo was a significant contributor to the centralization of spiritual authority within the Church and in reaffirming papal authority. The bishop of Rome had gradually become viewed as the chief patriarch in the Christian Church.

From a pastoral perspective, he galvanized charitable works in a Rome beset by famines, an influx of refugees, and poverty. He further associated the practice of fasting with charity and almsgiving.

CSA Minute ~ Sharing Christ



Jesus told his disciples, "Rise up, and be not afraid." Now it is our turn to answer the call, to rise up and be united in the mission of Christ. Please prayer-

fully consider making a one-time or recurring gift to help continue this mission and to help St. Matthew Parish bring the hope of Jesus and his message to this eastside neighborhood.

We have several urgent maintenance issues that need to be addressed, security fencing, removal of fallen trees, masonry work, and roof repairs. The cost of all that needs to be done was approved by the Parish Council; and, because the need is immediate, the Council approved taking the amount from our parish savings. This amount will need to be replaced, and part of that replacement will come from our CSA overage which is returned to the parish.

We have an AoD target of \$14,300, but the parish set an internal target of \$60,000, less than we actually received last year; but enough so that after our CSA target is met, we have an opportunity of gaining \$40,000 to apply to our operating costs.

Please again prayerfully consider giving to the Catholic Services Appeal. You will be supporting the archdiocesan programs in a big way, and you will be supporting your home parish of St. Matthew as well.
