From Father Duane's Desk

I noted in my homily on the first week of Advent that it is good to take a look behind us to see where we are going in the future. That simple task is part of our "Advent adventure." As I did that, I reflected upon the memorial of

the deceased we displayed in church, the Memorial Mass which I felt was very prayerful, and, especially, the Book of Remembrance in which you inscribed the names of parents, family, relatives, friends, and acquaintances.

As the memorial was taken down for this year, I read each name you wrote. By name and inference, I could tell who wrote it. I prayed for each soul in the Book and for the one who remembered their friend or loved one. I was moved by the thoughtfulness you showed in taking the time to "remember." My prayerful reflection was that no matter how young or old, recent or past, when that person died, he or she is still important to you, and <u>you</u> remembered. The Church teaches it is fitting and proper to pray for the dead. The community of faith remembers as we celebrate All Saints Day and All Souls Day, and we remember in our hearts those who were dear to us as we inscribe their names in the Book of Remembrance.

On a more temporal topic, today we have our Gold'n Harvest 50/50 Raffle Drawing. Due to the pandemic, we are not having our annual parish breakfast, and I am very disappointed in that. However, I am hopeful that our live-streamed drawing at noon today will be successful. I could tell parishioners tried very hard to make it a success by selling and buying as many tickets as they could.

Whatever the outcome, I want to say thank you for your efforts. This year has been very difficult and like so many others, we too are struggling financially. But with the grace of God and the cooperation of people we will get through this pandemic and life will return to normal.

2nd Sunday of Advent



People knew over a year in advance that the Pope was coming for a visit to America and the preparations began. Security, space limitations and requirements, protocols, crowd management, itineraries, invitations, regulations, and so much more was neces-

sary to pull this event off effectively. It's not every day that we get a visit from such a prominent dignitary. Thought, effort, meticulous attention to detail and vision all are necessary to make this thing work. After all, he can't just show up in the ordinary and normal daily routines of life and catch people unprepared! Tickets have to be purchased, buses rented, hotel rooms reserved, and travel arrangements made early because it will be impossible to see him if we wait too long!

We do this kind of preparing not only for prominent religious figures but for political dignitaries, notable sports figures, people of fame, and even actors. If an individual intrigues us, we are going to want to do all we have to do to get a "good seat" in the house. Does Jesus Christ captivate this much of our attention? We are asked to prepare the way of the Lord and to do so not with frantic frenzy but patient enthusiasm. We do not have to stand on a street corner making profound announcements about God's coming or become overly zealous in our embrace of the Good News. Our task is quieter, more interior, captivating, and consuming. We are asked to change. We have to conduct our lives with holy devotion.

Is the cost of that ticket too much for you? Don't you want the "best seat" in the house? You don't want to miss Our Lord's arrival when he comes, do you? After all, if he comes while you are going about your daily routines without you even knowing, he may catch you off guard. Or, he may come in disguise looking like a beggar, a prisoner, migrant, refugee, or someone who is lost. Would you be ready to recognize him then? Preparing for the coming of Christ requires a change of mind, heart, and behavior. It is not adequate to simply do the things we always do. We want our lives to speak of the exciting news of Christ's coming and the joy that the Gospel brings. It has to do with our demeanor, values, priorities, choices, and how we structure daily routines. Of course, it involves sacrifice. All anticipations do! Are you excited, captivated, enthusiastic, and sitting on the edge of your seat eager to celebrate his coming among us at Christmas, and waiting for him to come again? If not, why not?
