What are the little ones? They are the poor, the marginalized, the women and men at the well, the Zacchaeus' looking for Jesus from a tree, those mired in sin, the blind who want to see,




and the lame who want to walk. They are the lepers and the different ones who have been told that they are unclean, and the ones who suffer from abuse and grave injustices and oppression. They are children who want nothing more than to be loved and enjoy celebrating their innocence. These are all the little ones and they are all vulnerable. Life already brings them burdens, we don't need to add to them.

St. Oscar Romero said, "When the church hears the cry of the oppressed it cannot but denounce the social structures that give rise to and perpetuate the misery from which the cry arises." Why are so many people still so gravely hurting? We have the resources and the means to make things better. We choose not to. There are still those things called greed, pride, lust, apathy, jealously, gluttony, and anger that prevent us from seeing each other and people to be loved and not objects to be used. Is this how God intended things to be?

God loves what is good and upright. It doesn't matter who did it or where it came from. In God's eyes, the end result is always faith, hope, and love. Those will always unite a person with God. We fill our lives with many things that are not good either for ourselves or for others. All of us have to work to discover what it is, exactly, that leads to the world's brokenness. There are people, systems, and ideologies in place that foster oppression and injustice rather than equity and fairness. Sadly, our complacency can be the greatest evil. Turning a blind eye, ignoring the truth, and believing that we are helpless to fix so great a problem, does little to move us closer to the kingdom of God. As members of the Body of Christ, we cannot condone anything that keeps people in misery.

As it is said, charity begins at home. Perhaps a good place to start is with our own households and making sure their foundations are properly laid.



Apostle of Charity Feast Day, September 27

Vincent de Paul was born in Gascony, France on April 14, 1581, to a family of peasant farmers. He had four brothers and two sisters.

He studied humanities in Dax, France and graduated in theology at Toulouse. He was ordained in 1600, remaining in Toulouse until he went to Marseille for an inheritance. In 1605 on his way back from Marseille, he was taken captive by Turkish pirates, who brought him to Tunis and sold him into slavery. After converting his owner to Christianity, Vincent escaped in 1607.

Upon his return to France, he went onto Rome where he continued his studies until 1609. He was sent back to France to serve King Henry IV as chaplain to Marguerite de Valois. He was also the parish priest at Clichy for awhile, later serving the Gondi family as confessor and spiritual director to Madame Gondi. He began giving preaching missions to the peasants on the estate with her aid.

Vincent de Paul was appointed chaplain to the galleys, and in this capacity, he gave missions for the galley slaves.

In 1625, he founded the Congregation of the Mission, a society of missionary priests commonly known as the *Vincentians* or *Lazarists*. In 1633, with the assistance of Louise de Marillac, he founded the Daughters of Charity. He was renowned for his compassion, humility, and generosity.

In 1705, the process of de Paul's canonization was instituted. On August 13, 1729, Vincent was declared blessed by Pope Benedict XIII and canonized eight years later by Pope Clement XII on June 14, 1737.

His body was exhumed 53 years after his death, and it was shown to have little decay. When it was exhumed at his canonization, however, it was determined that decomposition was caused by an underground flood. His bones are preserved in a wax case, and his heart is still incorrupt and displayed in a reliquary in the motherhouse chapel of the Daughters of Charity in Paris.

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was established by French university students in 1833 lead by Blessed Frederic Ozanam. The Society is active and present in 132 countries continuing the good work of St. Vincent de Paul.

In our own parish, we give special recognition to those *Vincentians* who serve the poor and marginalized in our eastside community. God bless them for the work that they do!

Help **"sock it to us"** and keep people in our community warm this winter.

Until October 31st, the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program of Wayne County sponsored by Catholic Charities of Southeast Michigan

are holding their 29th annual sock collection. This effort is part of "A National Day of Service and Remembrance" Project and is meeting an important need in the community. Socks, while necessary, are rarely collected and distributed. Socks collected will be distributed to veterans and their families and human services agencies throughout Wayne County.

<u>New socks</u> of all sizes, colors, and patterns for men, women, and children are needed. Patterned and colorful socks for pre-school age children are particularly welcome. In 2019, 9,868 pairs of sock were collected by 22 different agencies and individuals and then distributed to 18 community organizations.

This year, St. Matthew Parish is joining the effort to continue to help keep people warm this winter in Michigan. It is the goal to collect more socks than ever before, maybe reaching a total of over 10,000 socks!

A special "laundry basket" will be placed at the St. Matthew statue for your donations. Please help in this most simple and easy way. If you desire, monetary donations are welcome to help purchase socks. **Please do not remove any labels on the socks**. These are needed for the sorting process.

Witnessing Christ through Vocations -

Realizing society's focus on secular careers over vocations, the Office of Priestly Vocations has launched an initiative to encourage young people to



discern God's specific plan for them. Held quarterly, "Cultivating the Call" begins with Holy Hour and includes a casual dinner, Adoration, Benediction, inspiring music, and testimonies from priests, religious brothers and sisters, and seminarians.


Parents are able to bring their children to these gatherings, but anyone who works with young people can attend as well to learn about engaging in more conversations about vocations, according to Father Joe Horn, director of Priestly Vocations.

"We don't talk about it, we don't have that conversation, listen to a young person and encourage them to accept God's vocation, or to look at their future as a vocation rather than just a career builder," he explained.

The CSA supports vocations to the priesthood and religious life through regional gatherings like "Cultivating the Call" and "The Watchmen," as well as discernment retreats and a vocation day for junior high students at Sacred Heart Major Seminary, and events with Archbishop Allen H. Vigneron.

The Priestly Vocations Office also provides outreach to parishes and schools and vocations literature, brochures, and prayer cards.

"Listening to God's call for your life will lead to your ultimate happiness, not choosing the career that gives you the most money or seems most thrilling," said Father Horn. "A vocation is not something you do, it's who you are."
